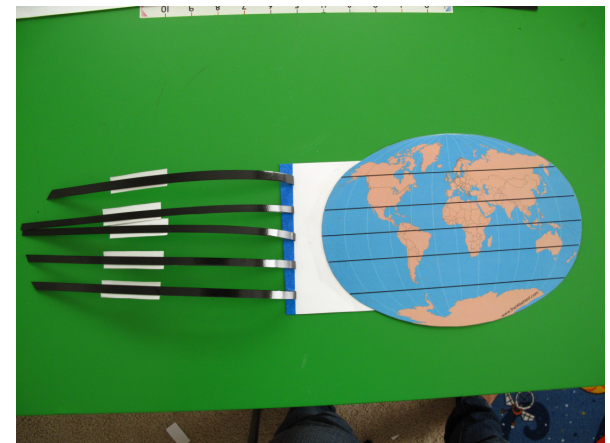
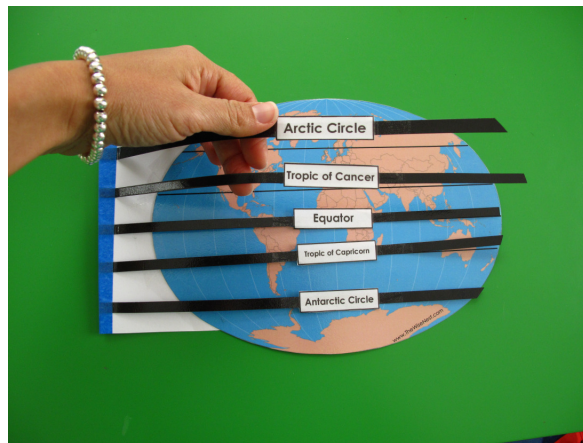


## FIVE MAJOR CIRCLES OF LATITUDE



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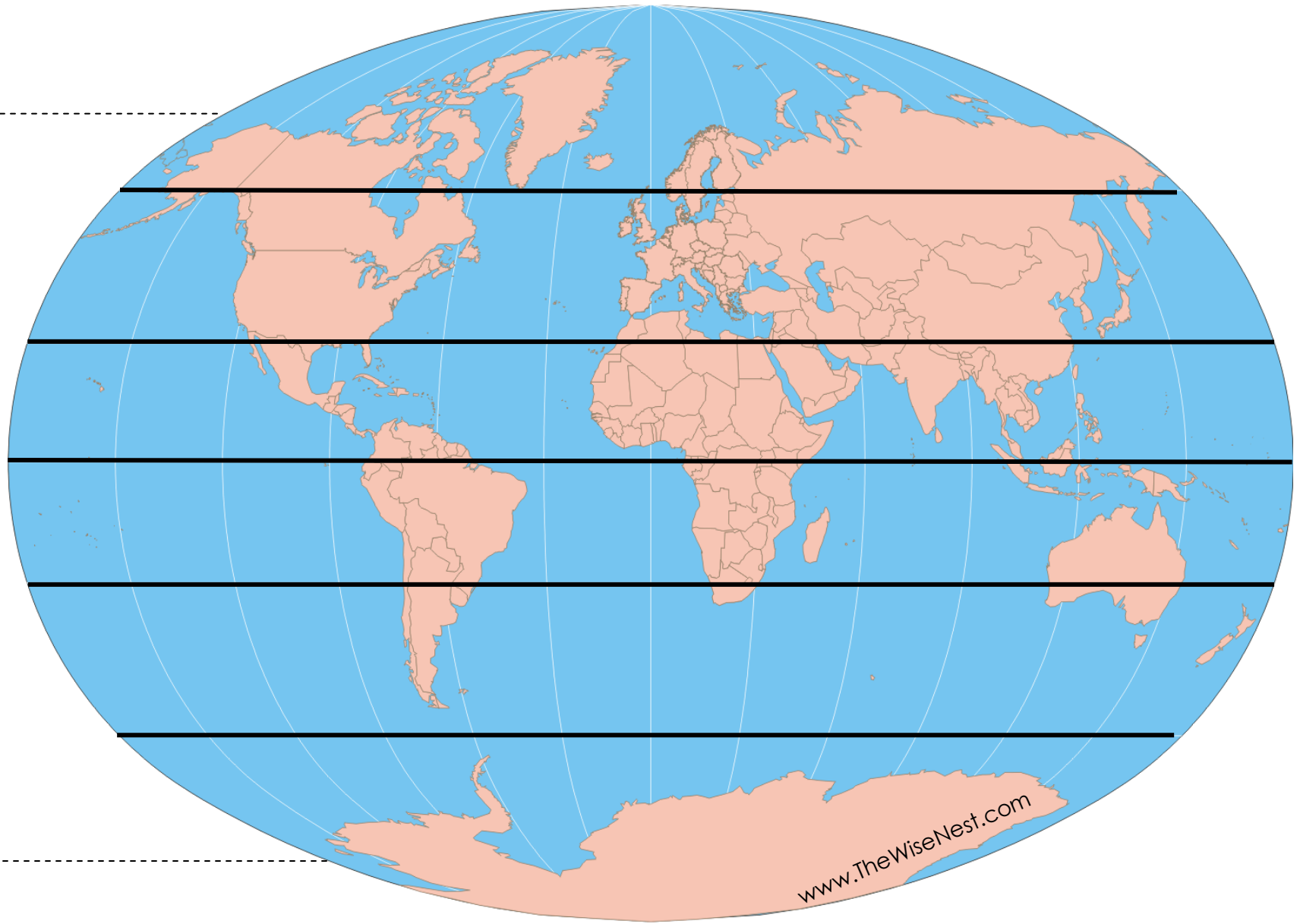
This is an interactive worksheet to review the major circles of latitude. Cut the outline of the Earth and the dashed lines on the first sheet. Cut out the lines on the second sheet. (For more durability, I recommend that you print them on cardstock and laminate both sheets BEFORE cutting them out) Tape the cut out lines at the edge of the first sheet aligning them with the circles of latitude drawn on the map. Use the lines as “flaps” to review the circles of latitude.
